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### Tell us a bit about yourself.

I am 86 years old and born in Heaton, to a ½ German father who lost 1 arm in the British Army. I worked as an Aerial photographer in the fleet army, a servant on an Air carrier and office manager for an electrical firm. I have been married twice both of them died from cancer, I have 2 daughters, and 5 great grandchildren.

My second wife Elsie, 19 years younger than me, came to my photo class years ago and we started to walk together in France, India and other countries. We

learnt Chinese and Indian cooking from scratch.

I enjoyed photography, and joined the World End Camera Club and Gosforth Camera Club. Without qualifications, the Head of Gosforth School asked me to teach adults photography, but when my eyes got bad I had to stop but I then started watercolour painting. Copies of my paintings with my name are still around in places.

I was diagnosed with Ushers Syndrome at school and had to wear glasses. Sadly I had an accident when one of my daughters pushed me in the eye which made my eye detached I was in hospital for 10 weeks! This caused macular degeneration then I had cataract.

### Did you enjoy attending our Deafblind Pop In?

**Yes definitely!** Being Deafblind the group helps me to talk about issues with other members and I get support on different things. I use touch type computer and a guide on the computer for large font. I can scan books or magazines which then the computer 'Daniel' reads back in a voice, he even read out my emails! I am delighted with it as need to hear the words aloud because of my hearing loss. I love the books and sounds – even when I am on the loo!

### What was your best experience?

I remember going to a coffee morning and a Deaf person taught me Deafblind manual, I was over the moon when I could fingerspell my name with the Deaf woman. Losing my hearing was worse than losing my sight, I miss phones, knockings, rain and the winds, but I am determined to keep going and still cook anything and make bread! I know I have had a rich life and have no regrets.

### What is your next exciting plan?

Now as my hearing gets worse, I am transferring a lot of my old LP records into CDs and SD memory chip such as Jazz. Also transferring thousands of my photos into CDs and memory chips, I took photos of the elephants and gorillas in Sri Lanka.



### **Big Word Consultation Event**

Newcastle St. John's OAP Group, North Tyneside Deaf and Disabled Forum, Northumberland Deaf Club and Deaflink held a big consultation event in October about the Big Word interpreting agency , who provide interpreting for foreign languages as well as British Sign Language (BSL) for Newcastle Hospital Trust. Around 70 D/deaf, deafblind, hard-of-hearing, interpreters and interpreting agencies attended and shared their views and concerns over the relationship between D/deaf people, hospitals and the subcontracts with the BSL interpreting agencies.



The services remain the same for everyone living in South of Tyne - Gateshead, South Tyneside and Sunderland with Northern Sign.

### **Feedback statistics from the event:**

- 93% voted yes need to know the name of the interpreter in their hospital appointment.
- 91% voted no don't know how to use the complaint system for hospitals.
- 80% found the event useful.

With a grant of £1,000 from the Newcastle LGBT network the group decided to hold an Awareness raising event last month to share information, build confidence and develop partnerships with other similar LGBT groups in the city – using role-plays and holding a Question and Answer session. ### **Nexus Metro and Buses Issues and improvements**

The electronic visual displays installing into the Metro train were delayed in the summer due to the take over of a German Company DB Rego.

Nexus informed us they have a problem with the visual displays, but will make sure the displays will be working and running shortly.

Claire from Nexus also attended our Deafblind Pop In in July and consulted with our Deafblind members and listened to their concerns and questions.

### IMPORTANT AND USEFUL INFORMATION

Accident and Emergency department in Newcastle General Hospital is CLOSED. Now medical emergencies go to a brand new, specialist Emergency Department at the Royal Victoria Infirmary. You'll be able to reach the new A and E via Richardson Road, as the specialist unit will be located just along from the Leazes Wing entrance. You'll also find parking for emergency requirements only. See map below.



RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) Safe At Home provides information and support to as many families with SAFEATHOME children under five as possible. A website has been developed and a Safety DVD (Great visual DVD showing the dangers to under 5 years olds – not BSL signed) has been produced which is now available to view on the website

www.safeathome.rospa.com and at local children's centre's. Safe At Home has also produced an excellent height chart with Safety tips and emergency first aid steps, available on the website to families free of charge.

The eligibility criteria for families to receive safety equipment in the home such as stair gates, rubber bath mats, fire guards, window restrictors etc, on www.safeathome.rospa.com/families/index.htm . Criteria includes points such as the family must live in an area covered by a participating scheme, the family must have a child or children aged 0 - 5 years, be unable to afford safety equipment because they are on a very low income or unemployed, receive one of a range of benefits, including disability living allowance care or mobility component for a child, income support, tax credits etc.



The London Metropolitan police released their great new youth website in the summer <a href="www.safe.met.police.uk/">www.safe.met.police.uk/</a> - useful information about safety and crimes such as bullying, internet safety, travel

safety, personal theft, domestic violence, hate crime, assaults, gangs, drugs and alcohol. Also advice and tips if you are worried about someone, doing something you are worried about, getting pressure from your friends or been a victim and need help?

Muslim Deaf UK (MDUK) is the first national Deaf organisation to support Deaf Muslims in the development and learning of their faith and culture. MDUK has created a website to make Islam accessible to the Deaf community in BSL -

<u>www.muslimdeaf.org</u> Aim at both Deaf and hearing Muslims but also available for anyone from any faith, the website have many interesting information about Islam including the first ever Qur'an translation in BSL!



Neema Crafts restaurant in Iringa, Tanzania (<a href="www.neemacrafts.com">www.neemacrafts.com</a>) won a Best of British award, set up and run by Yorkshire couple Susie and Andy Hart from Harrogate. They employ 103 D/deaf and disabled people in its craft workshops, where they make everything from


elephant dung paper to micro-solar panels. The restaurant, which is entirely staffed by deaf people, serves fantastic food, cakes, ice cream and some of the best tea and coffee in East Africa. It serves local dishes alongside a taste of home, with cakes made to recipes handed down by Susie's great-grandmother.

What the judges say: 'In an out-of-the-way place in a country not known for its gastronomic expertise, and staffed entirely by deaf people, this restaurant may not be conventional. But it is truly inspirational. The food is described by its many fans the world over as sensational (delicious), particularly the lasagne and the lemon meringue pie. But it is the atmosphere of the place as much as the food that enthuses its fans. For them it is a very special and unique place. As one commentary put it: "Good food, good people and a wonderful cause to boot!"

# **ALEX'S CHRISTMAS LEFTOVER RECIPE: Nice and Simple Warm Baked Ham Rolls!**

### Ingredients:

- 1) 2 thick slices of white bread
- 2) 2 eggs beaten
- 3) ½ teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 4) ½ teaspoon paprika
- 5) 1 tablespoon oil
- 6) 2 tablespoon fresh breadcrumbs
- 7) 2 tablespoons chopped parsley (herb)
- 8) 2 tablespoons chopped chives (herb)
- 9) ½ teaspoon salt and pepper
- 10) 4 slices of ham



Remove the crust from the bread, toast it then break it up into crumbs then add in a mixing bowl.

Cover with beaten eggs and leave to soak for 2-3 minutes.

Whisk in the nutmeg, paprika, oil, herbs, salt and pepper.

Spread the bread mixture onto slices of ham.

Then roll it up and if necessary, secure it with cocktail stick or skewers.

Place in a greased ovenproof dish in an oven at 180 degrees or Gas Mark 4 for 20 minutes.

Serve hot with a mixed salad and/or jacket potato etc.
