Tell us a bit about yourself.

I am 35 years old, married with two boys, 16 years old and 9 years old. I work for HealthWORKS Newcastle as a Community Health Trainer My husband and children are all hearing, I live in a hearing world and I am treated as a hearing person. This is not always a good thing and it can be difficult at times to keep up as a hearing person, but I have known no different.

I was 12/13 when I was fitted with hearing aids. It was said that my hearing was deteriorating since birth but I had taught myself to lip-read so well that my hearing loss was not detected until my teenage years. I did not learn to sign as I have good speech and doctors and teachers said that my speech would be affected if I was to sign. I have been a cochlear implant user for nearly 11 years now.

How do you feel being a cochlear implant user?

Having a cochlear implant has been one of the best things ever. It has changed my world and given me loads of confidence. It has enabled me to move forward in my life, and made it possible for me to find a job that I love and a drive to achieve what I set out to do. Before my implant I was beginning to withdraw into myself. It has given me a second chance.

You have helped set up the new Cochlear Implant support group, why do you think it is necessary?

Because of some technical and medical problems I have had recently with my implant I realise that there was nowhere to go to for support that I really needed. This was to talk to people in the same boat as me. Someone to say "yeah I understand, I've been there".

With the help and support of my family, friends, the organisation I work for and Deaflink I have managed to pull myself back together and I am getting back to my old self again. So a Big Thanks to them all.

Thank you Sarah. Our best wishes to you and your family for the future.

Newcastle Citizens Assembly

Newcastle Citizens Assembly is a new way for anyone who lives, works or studies in Newcastle to get involved with improving their city. In response Newcastle Deaflink set up a deaf service user group to give their views and ideas, nine members attended the first meeting in September.

One of our improvements was as a result of incidents on the Metro where deaf people have not heard the announcements and in some cases have been trapped at the depot. We presented the solution, installing visual electronic displays, using role play (see photo) at a major event at the Great North Museum in November with key decision makers from Newcastle Council in the audience.

The good news, John Usher from Nexus (Metro and bus) was on our table at the event! He was happy to inform us of future changes and will meet with our user group in the future. Hopefully the Metro will have the electronic displays added soon!

The User Group brought up a lot of issues around transport, hospitals and the community. These will be followed up with the different departments within the Council. We want to say a big thank you to the members for their time and support in the meetings and event. Great team work!!

Where have we been?

DeafHope Domestic Violence Conference, London

Maureen McGarrity, Deaflink Chair, went to this conference in October The main presentation was given by Susan Gonzalez from Deafhope USA on language, culture, communication barriers and breakdown in Domestic Violence. For example, how easy abuse can happen between Deaf and hearing people, Deaf to Deaf people, and Deaf people with their hearing family and Deaf/hearing children.

Issues were raised around accessibility for Deaf women. For example,

- The Minicom helpline and webpages need to be more accessible.
- Refuge staff needs to have Deaf awareness training around safety issues for example one such deaf victim was threatened by a person through the window in sign language!
- Deaf people need training awareness on domestic violence

Deaflink would like to see a DeafHope conference here in Newcastle. **Watch this space!**

Maureen's comment: 'Domestic Violence is not just about physical injury, it is more than that, it can be emotional, mental and verbal abuse, where money can be stopped and lives controlled. We really need to dig deeper and learn more about domestic violence. Women can be survivors not victims. The conference ended on a positive note and most of us left inspired about the day.'

Dignity for You, Dignity for Me - Respect for All conference

Four Deaf people attended this conference. It was about supporting and making people in the North East feel valued in healthcare. As the speakers talked about disabled people, they left out the D/deaf, Deafened, Deafblind and Hard-of-Hearing people, so we brought up issues and barriers that we face in the health services.

LGBT - Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Health Summit

This two-day conference covered the experiences, politics, myths and the health needs of LGBT communities. There were many choices of workshops which talked about the needs and experiences of LGBT people. Again the speakers left out the barriers and issues that LGBT people in the Deaf community have to overcome.

Deaflink will be working with Mesmac to set up a LGBT group in the New Year.

NHS Chlamydia Screening Training

Katie attended the training, where the information and statistics was extremely useful. Older People's Festival in the City Library on 1st October 2009

15 Deaf, Deafblind and Hard-of-Hearing people came along to the event at the City Library and found a lot of information about the activities in Newcastle. Some of them enjoyed having their hands massaged, they signed much quicker afterward! At the end we were all invited to see our own

personal birth or marriage records!

NEW 999 Text Emergency Service!

You can contact police, ambulance, fire rescue or coastguard by text 999! Register your mobile number by:

STEP 1. Text 'REGISTER' now on your mobile and send it to 999

STEP 2. Then after you get a text back (Terms & Conditions) - you text

back 'ACCEPT' to 999. You should get a SMS saying 'Your telephone number is registered with the emergency SMS'.

In emergency only, please text:

- Which emergency service? (Police, Ambulance, Fire or Coastguard)
- What wrong?
- Where? Address, place, road etc.

If got new mobile, please register again on new mobile! You can do this on www.emergencysms.org.uk on 'registering your mobile phone' page.

SYMPTOMS OF SWINE FLU

Sudden fever (38°C or above) and sudden coughs. Victims can also have: headache, tiredness (sleep a lot), chills (cold), sore muscles, arm or leg pain, diarrhoea (poo a lot) or tummy upset, sore throat, runny nose, sneezing, and don't want to eat food.

ALEX'S CHRISTMAS RECIPE!

Santa Snow Queen Dessert

Ingredients:

500ml Double Cream 2 boxes of meringue

2tbsp of sugar

Zest of a lemon

1 or 2 shot of Amaretto!



- 1. Pour double cream into a glass or metal bowl (suitable for freezing) and whisk until half thick and smooth cream.
- 2. Add a shot or two of Amaretto depend on how much you like.
- 3. Add the sugar and zest of a whole lemon.
- 4. Whisk again until the cream is nearly firm.
- 5. Break up all of the meringue and add to the bowl.
- 6. Careful turn over the cream and make sure the meringue is covered.
- 7. Put cling film on the bowl and put in the freezer for one to two hours in the end you want the dessert to be like ice cream, not too hard or frozen.
